ur family's retail pretzel store opened for business at 8:30 a.m. that pleasant Monday morning, just like it did every other week.

The dainty crocuses were blooming in the gardens out front and signs of spring and warmer days were in the air. The store clerk stocked the shelves full of colorful bags of pretzels and checked what mail orders had come in over the weekend. A few door prizes had to be readied for pickup. It seemed to be a regular and pleasant start to a new week on the job.

A few moments later, a man entered the store wearing the stereotypical dark, hooded sweatshirt, and with his one hand hidden in his pocket demanded the clerk to give him all the money in the cash register. Fingers trembling, she complied, and he bolted out the door with the cash. Thankfully nobody got hurt and the monetary loss was negligible.

Since then, I've thought much about the man who robbed us and fled that day. At first I'd felt a large amount of anger. How dare he do that to my family and our business and resources! We work hard! Why doesn't he go get a job somewhere instead of stealing from us? Then, when I learned he'd robbed three other local small businesses after ours, disgust added to my anger. Authorities soon apprehended him

and sentenced him to a fairly lengthy prison sentence—decades behind bars.

At first I felt a measure of relief. See, I thought, if you keep your nose clean and behave yourself, you don't end up in prison.

As time passed, I held to that same line of thinking, but every time the thought came, it seemed to be accompanied by a little whisper in my spirit saying, "Is that so?" And that whisper continued to get louder as the months passed and whenever we discussed *THE INCIDENT*.

I thought back through my life and over some of the really stupid things I've done. We all joke about the idiotic things in our past at times, and we even ponder how we can still be alive after all the dumb things we've done. Much of the jesting is done in good fun.

But one day that little whisper in my spirit got amplified. This time I heard, "But for the grace of God, every single human deserves a sentence, a punishment, a jail stay. You, Jill, are just as guilty as the one who robbed your store that day. Now start thinking about his story."

So I did. And, in spite of myself, my heart toward him began to soften. I started by researching every newspaper article covering the man and his four robberies. First, I learned that he'd lived not too far from my childhood home. Then I also read that he has a young daughter.

At the same time I was delving into his background, I was seeing many verses in the Bible telling me of Jesus' heart for those in prison. Verse after verse softened me and ultimately brought me to my knees in repentance for my previous attitudes:

- " ... I was in prison and you came to see me " (Matthew 25:36).
- " You suffered along with those in prison ..." (Hebrews 10:34).

"Continue to remember those in prison as if you were together with them in prison, ..." (Hebrews 13:3), and many more verses.

Soon, I knew I had to find him. God had done a work in my heart, and now I understood what I needed to do. The time had come for me to do whatever I could to offer him forgiveness (on behalf of our family) and facilitate his own redemption in whatever way I could.

It was a complicated, twisting, turning road to find the address of the man who now occupied many of my thoughts. Through much determination and phone conversations with policemen, investigating agents, and local and state jail wardens, I learned the mailing address of the facility where he will spend most of the rest of his life.

I have communicated with him by letter several times to date. The best report I can give at this point is that his last chapters have not yet been written. I pray for him often. Someday I hope he and I will laugh together in Heaven as we chat about THE INCIDENT.

## LEWIS: A STORY OF LIFE CHANGE

Part II

The dramatic story of God's powerful transformation of Lewis was featured in Jubilee's December 2021 Newsletter (see Lewis: A Story of Life Change). God is now using Lewis to lead a ministry he founded in Philadelphia upon his release from prison. "Men of Purpose was birthed as a continuation of the fellowship that men in prison had established in that setting," explains Lewis. "I want something so solid that when men get out they know they have a place where they are warmly received, because there are people there who are like-minded. Men of Purpose is bridging the gap between the Church on the outside and the Church on the inside."

Currently, the group meets every Saturday morning via Zoom to spend time together in the Word, lift each other up in prayer, and discuss ways that they can move forward in their mission to connect Christians on the "inside" with those "outside" the prison walls. One hurdle is the stigma attached to people coming out of prison. There may be doubts as to how genuine a person's faith is when they have become a Christian while incarcerated. Others wonder if it is simply "jailhouse religion," and question whether or not the person can really be trusted. Lewis provides one solution to this problem. "I think the way to overcome that stigma is to have churches become involved with brothers and sisters before they even get out. I believe that when this happens, the Church is authentic to the Scriptures and to what Jesus would do."

Similarly, Jubilee has been developing a curriculum for churches that will teach important concepts related to welcoming those who have been in prison into their church family. This curriculum will allow churches with a heart for prison ministry to learn from some of the hard lessons experienced by Jubilee over the years,

so they can better serve those who are coming out of prison. Jubilee's desire is to equip churches to better understand, welcome, and love those who have been affected by incarceration. Lewis highlights that those being released from prison "need to know that the Church, which is their family, is really there for them."

As Men of Purpose builds bridges between God's people in prison and those on the outside, please pray that God will continue to guide and direct their steps. Their network of formerly incarcerated brothers in Christ is growing in numbers and in faith! Pray also for Lewis as he shares the message that the Church behind bars and the Church in our communities need one another. "When you have the Church out here invest in the Church on the inside, it can't do anything but good. It's investing in the Kingdom. The strengthening of the brothers on the inside by the brothers and sisters out here definitely has an evangelistic effect on the inside!"
